Present: Mayor Barry Glantz, Council Members Lawrence, Baseley, Faron, Hoffman, Ruzicka and Kramer (6:14 pm)

Staff present: City Administrator Mark Perkins, Chief Eidman and City Attorney Carl Lumley.

1. Policing Update

Chief Eidman reviewed the presentation slides regarding Creve Coeur Police Department's response to the National Policing Issues that stemmed from the Department of Justice report on the Ferguson Police Department, along with Senate Bill 5 and the most recent Police Standards Bill. (Exhibit A)

Council Member Ruzicka asked what the revenue from the Creve Coeur Courts in relation to the city budget as a whole.

Chief Eidman stated currently the court revenue only accounts for eight (8 %) percent of our total budget. Creve Coeur is lower than the St. Louis average of twelve (12 %) percent.

Mayor Glantz requested that the Department of Justice Report be made available to all Council Members for review.

2. Approval of Work Session Minutes Dated March 14, April 11, May 9 and May 23, 2016

Council Member Hoffman moved, seconded by Council Member Baseley to approve work session minutes of March 14, April 11, May 9 and May 23, 2016. Passed by unanimous vote.

The Police Department has completed a review of the Department of Justice report on the Ferguson Police Department, along with Senate Bill 5, and the most recent Police Standards Bill.



CCPD Response to National Policing Issues

The DOJ report has been called “shocking, scorching, and damaging” to Law Enforcement in general. The report highlighted examples of outrageous police misconduct, practices contributing to the style of policing that are unacceptable in today’s society.

Biased Based Policing

Biased Based Policing - the DOJ suggested the development of a comprehensive policy and procedure for biased based policing to ensure constitutional policing within a police department.

Use of Force Reporting and Investigations

Use of Force Reporting and Investigations - The DOJ recommends the development and implementation of supervisory reviews of Use of Force as well as requiring the supervisor to conduct a complete review of each use of force.

Proper Supervision

Proper supervision provides officers with the direction and guidance necessary to improve and develop as police officers; ensures that officers follow department procedure; and identifies, corrects, and prevents officer misconduct.

Proper Supervision

The Police department has achieved all of the recommendations from the DOJ and has done so for a considerable amount of time.



Accepting and Investigating Complaints of Misconduct

Accepting and Investigating Complaints of Misconduct- modify procedures for accepting complaints to make it easier and less intimidating for individuals to register formal complaints about police conduct.

Training

In addition to the supervisory oversight, the PD ensures proper continued training annually. The CCPD receives training in this area above that expected from the POST commission.

Training

Training-officer training is essential to ensure that officers understand the policies and procedures that have been put in place; to identify the legal standards applicable in those policies; and specify the actions and behaviors necessary to conform to the standards.

The United States Supreme Court has repeatedly held that a police department has a duty to train its officers on core tasks that they are required to complete.

Training this year will include the use of de-escalation to a Use of Force, as well as Police legitimacy and procedural justice considerations.

Community Policing

Develop and put into action a policy and detailed plan for comprehensive implementation of community policing and problem-solving principles.
